daycare VS preschool

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

childcare center	Chil	dcare	center
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Infants and young toddlers. Often will offer preschool for children 3-5 and some offer after school care.

Typically full workday coverage.

Typically year-round, with limited holiday closures.
Part-day and part-week programs are common for toddlers.

Usually provides some type of formal curriculum.

State law sets ratio by age. Group size is limited, but doesn't impact ratio.

Often requires a child to be potty trained to enter preschool because of facility limitations.

Often costs are highest for infants and decrease as the child gets older.

home daycare

Varied, but often 0-5, with after school care for up to age 12.

Typically full workday coverage.

Typically year-round, with limited closures for holidays. Part-week or part-day care is not usually offered.

Varies. Sometimes a formal curriculum is used, but always.

State laws determine ratio by group size and ages of children.

May require potty training by a certain age for convenience. Sometime supplies are provided and a fee is charged.

Often care costs the same for all children.
Usually less expensive than centers.

preschool

Typically ages 3-5, though some may accept younger children.

Often part-day programs. Some may offer full day.

Often closed for summer. Some offer part-week options.

Formal curriculum is used. Educational philosophy varies.

State laws set ratio by age. Some programs, like co-ops, may have different ratios laws.

Often requires all children to be potty trained because of facility limitations.

Care costs the same for all children. Less expensive than daycare centers.
